the tour would not have taken place:



Heritage Week In KAVHA

continued from front page

Heritage is a complex jumble of things: the language, the stories, the songs, the celebrations and traditions, the heroes, the quiet achievers and the rogues, the buildings and shapes in the landscape, the people who built, ploughed, lived, suffered and dreamed, the insiders and the outsiders who shaped what Norfolk is today. Heritage is not static; it evolves and blends, ebbs and flows. If it is to be of use to a community it should bind it together.

KAVHA is the cradle that initially nurtured the Pitcairn heritage. On that cold, miserable day in June 1856, it was at Kingston jetty the Pitcairners came ashore. At Government House Mrs Stewart provided tea and a warming fire. It was in the Military Barracks they settled their children and themselves for that first strange night. Their leader, the Reverend George Hunn Nobbs with his family of twelve children came to call No 9 Quality Row, (now the KAVHA Research Centre) home. The other families moved into their allotted homes along Quality Row.

It was in the KAVHA precinct that the Pitcairners learned the unfamiliar ways of cows and corn growing, built their church and schooled their children. They created a community in a new place, birthed their babies and buried their dead, lived their traditions and created new ones which remain strong and central to what Norfolk is today.

But the buildings the Pitcairners lived in, the very cemetery in which they buried their loved ones were also part of something else, another heritage. In 1788 a group of twenty three recent arrivals from Britain via New South Wales had begun an audacious experiment to create a European settlement on the foreshores of what we now know as Kingston. They cleared and planted and built moving quickly up the more sheltered valley of Arthur's Vale, turning a precarious toehold on this small Island into a thriving agricultural community. Norfolk Island became a vital sister colony to the struggling Port Jackson settlement in New South Wales. These colonies shared the calamity of losing the First Fleet flag ship "Sirius" on Kingston Reef, the constant threat of hunger, the driving ambition of the New South Wales Corp to own and manipulate.

Even though orders were given to erase this early settlement in 1814, its footprint can still be seen in the foundation stones of the first government house, and in the alignment and stones of some other buildings around the landing place at Kingston and in the stones of scattered buildings in Arthur's Vale and Music Valley, in the remains of a road up Flagstaff Hill. Another much grimmer penal settlement began in 1825 and, ironically it is to this settlement that we owe the elegant Georgian buildings of Quality Row, and the ruins that make Kingston such an important part of the Australian convict heritage. In 2010, Kingston and Arthur's vale Historic Area was recognized as a valuable part of the heritage of the World.

Underneath all these significant layers and the sands of Emily Bay lies yet another layer; the tangible evidence of Polynesian settlement. The first colonial settlers must have appreciated the banana groves left in

Arthur's Vale by these earlier settlers or puzzled at the remains of Polynesian canoes in Ball's Bay long before the marae floor behind Emily Bay was uncovered in 1994. The Polynesian layer provides a connection felt by many New Zealand visitors and another connection to the Tahitian women of the Pitcairn settlement.

Norfolk became a refuge for American whalers scouring the South Pacific for whales, leaving their lemon pie recipes and Thanksgiving tradition. The Melanesian Mission left Norfolk the beautiful St Barnabas chapel.

So the physical and cultural layers of settlement in KAVHA underpin the social, economic and political layers of heritage that evolved into the strong vibrant culture of Norfolk today. Heritage can bind us as a community or it can divide us; it is all about how we see ourselves. On Norfolk we are fortunate because the fabric of KAVHA has meaning for all of us.

From April 12 until May 26 during the Heritage Festival, the KAVHA Research Centre is running a "Walk back in Time" tour of Arthur's Vale each weekday between 1pm and 2.30 pm to compliment the Norfolk Island Museum tours of Kingston. Bookings can be made by calling 23009.

On April 17th the Research Centre at No 9 Quality Row will be hosting a World Heritage Day Morning Tea and house tour. The guest Speaker will be the Hon. David Buffett MLA. Bookings are essential on 23009.

The Research Centre will also be open 10.00am until 4.00pm as usual for visitors and residents interested in exploring their KAVHA heritage.

Final Stage Data Collection for The NICHE Trial

The NICHE Trial is heading into its final stage of data collection. Back in 2012 the NICHE Team took some anthropometric and health measurements from about 100 Norfolk Island residents. A further 50 people were asked to wear a motion sensor which recorded things such as activity, heart rate, energy used and sleep patterns.

For the final stage of data collection we will be asking these participants for 15 minutes of their time to retake their measurements and assess if their participation in the trial has influenced any behaviours.

Tania Christian will be back on Island from the 26th of April until the 13th of May to carry out the measurement. PJ Wilson will be contacting these participants over the coming weeks to arrange a time.

The participants who will be wearing the motion sensor will be required to wear it for at least two week days and one weekend day. They will also receive a print out of their health information.

Participants are reminded that all of their information is strictly confidential and all data will be de-identified before any publications are made.

Additional questions will be asked in the follow up survey that discuss the concept of Personal Carbon Trading which proposes hypothetical financial incentives and disincentives to see if this would further influence participants behaviour and whether this would be acceptable across a population. All results will be fed back to the community.

One organ and tissue donor can transform the lives of 10 or more people.

There are approximately 1500 Australians waiting for a transplant at any time. Some Australian residents and even Norfolk Islanders have died waiting for a transplant. Some spend weeks or months in hospital, with others making several trips to hospital every week for dialysis or other treatment.

People who need an organ transplant are usually very ill or dying because an organ is failing. They range from babies and children through to older people.

People who need a tissue transplant can also be of any age. In some cases, tissue can save lives. More often, it greatly improves the recipient's life.

Almost anyone can donate organs and tissues. The determining factors are where and how a person dies, and the conditions of their organs and tissues. While your age and medical history will be considered, you shouldn't assume you're too young, too old or not healthy enough to become a donor.

How to register

The Australian Organ Donor Register (the Donor Register) is the only national register for people to record their decision about becoming an organ and tissue donor for transplantation after death.

The Donor Register ensures a person's donation decision can be verified 24 hours a day, seven days a week by authorised personnel anywhere in Australia. In the event of a person's death, information about their donation decision, accessed from the Donor Register by authorised personnel, can be provided to the family of the deceased.

Recording your decision on the Donor Register is voluntary and you have complete choice over which organs and tissues you wish to donate. If you don't want to become an organ and tissue donor, you can register your decision not to donate on the Donor Register.

The Donor Register is not for registering decisions about donating organs and tissue for scientific research purposes or for the manufacture of biological medical products. For information regarding these processes, contact your local state health department.

To register to become an organ and tissue donor:

You must be 16 years or older to register your organ donation decision on the register.

Even if you have previously registered your decision elsewhere (for example by ticking a box on your driver's licence renewal) it is still important that you register on the Australian Organ Donor Register as it is the only national register and details can be linked to your Medicare number.

Most importantly, you need to discuss your organ and tissue donation decision with your family as your family will always be asked to confirm your donation decision before donation for transplantation can proceed.

Which organs and tissue can be donated? In Australia, people can donate the following:-

Organs - including kidneys, heart, lungs, liver and pancreas.

Tissue - including heart valves, bone tissue, skin, eye and pancreas tissue.

Whicker's Walkabout caused a "mini" exodus from England

"I first visited Norfolk Island in 1960 and its friendliness prompted me to find my own island home. This speck between Australia and New Zealand is a paradise where nothing bites or stings".

These were some of the words Alan Whicker used to describe some of his favourite places that he had visited during the production of his BBC and Yorkshire Television programme "Whicker's World".

"Rest in Peace, beneath this site. On beautiful Norfolk Island Your work is done, your tale is told. We offer our thanks hand in hand.

The segment of his first visit to Norfolk Island was played in England on a cold, miserable Winter's day in 1960 and was instrumental in the late Bill Underwood and his wife Marian (pictured above), packing up their belongings lock, stock and barrel and making the long trip to start a new period in their lives on Norfolk Island.

They were two of the many British migrants who made the long journey to Norfolk Island after this programme.

Both Bill and Marian became involved in local community activities such as the A. and H. Society, the Musical and Dramatic Society, the Hospital Board, the Country Womens Association, the Royal Far West Children's Health Scheme and many other community organisations.

After a long and happy time with us, Bill died and was buried at the Kingston Cemetery on the 15th October 1983. Marian returned to Australia with her daughter Sheila and died on 19th November 1994. Her ashes were interred next to Bill's grave on 20th December 1994.

This week we had the pleasure of meeting up with the daughters of Bill and Marian and their families - Sheila and Mike Francis and son Guy and his wife Megan and children Maya and Jude; their daughter Clare and husband Toby Whitfield and children Eliza and Jonah. Pat and Neil Cowell and Pat's daughter - Sarah Farmer and her husband Nelson Saunders and their children Lily and Ella who are pictured below with third daughter Susan Stephens from New Zealand.

As can be gathered, the daughters followed Mum and Dad to the 'Colonies', but their son William (Berry) is still in England. William was in the RAF, stationed in Singapore, when Marian and Bill decided to immigrate to Norfolk Island. He returned to England to try and persuade them not to go, but all in vain. Son William did make a trip to Norfolk to visit his parents.

During the 50th year reunion, family members gathered at Kingston, where the grandchildren said words of affection to the grandparents they never knew and the gathering ended with the following words of a poem written by daughter Sheila Francis -

For the interest of long time residents, Alan Donald Whicker CBE (4th August 1921 – 12th July 2013) was a British journalist and television presenter and broadcaster. His career spanned almost 60 years, during which time he presented the documentary television programme Whicker's World for over 30 years. He was made a Commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE) in 2005 for services to broadcasting.

In 2010, the presenter named his four favourite places as Bali saying it was an island at the "centre of the universe," Hong Kong, where he had been visiting for 60 years along with Austria's capital. He said the "Viennese have perfected the art of civilised drinking." He also picked Norfolk Island in the Pacific: "A gentle corner of paradise, 12,000 miles from Britain and about 1,000 miles from anywhere else."

He made a second trip to Norfolk in July 1970 and a segment of the programme was entitled - "Husbands Shy Clear of Me, Boy...!" The programme summary goes on to record "Whicker visits Norfolk Island, a tiny piece of paradise drifting through the South Pacific where the descendants of the Bounty Mutineers live, the seamen who set Captain Bligh adrift in an open boat and returned to their Tahitian women. Today most islanders are still called Young, McCoy, Adams, Quintal, making isolated Norfolk an 18th Century storeroom of people - the way we used to be, once upon a time. They speak a unique dialect, a soft and joyful blend of West Country English and Tahitian. Their most indomitable character is Girlie Christian, 76-year-old descendant of Fletcher Christian who tells an extraordinary story. Girlie is a television original.

O3b wins first Australian telco customer

'Communications Day' 8 April 2014

Medium earth orbit satellite challenger O3b Networks has won a multi-year deal in the Australian territory of Norfolk Island. The island's incumbent provider, Norfolk Telecom, will use O3b as its backhaul provider from Norfolk Island to the Internet.

Currently all of the island's telephone and data traffic is routed to New Zealand by geo-stationary satellite. The switch to O3b will allow Norfolk Telecom to significantly increase its bandwidth, improving data rates and response times.

Local government owned Norfolk Telecom is the incumbent provider on Norfolk Island for mobile and fixed line telephone services as well as internet services.

Norfolk Telecom GM Kim Davies said the new O3b capacity will allow real time applications to be used for the first time such as internet gaming, healthcare, video on demand, e-commerce and elearning.

"O3b will revolutionise the internet for the people of Norfolk Island and will especially allow the island's young people high speed access to e-learning for education," Davies said.

O3b is planning a fleet of MEO satellites, providing capacity in almost 180 countries including Australia, and has build local gateways in Perth and more recently in Dubbo in regional NSW.

The firm says the medium orbit craft will provide broadband at vastly better latency – around 120ms – than existing systems, while keeping capacity pricing below \$1,000 per megabit.

O3b's investors include SES, Google and Liberty Global. Last month the company announced that its second group of 4 satellites have successfully completed all required ground testing and are now ready to ship.

The satellites will be launched from French Guiana as early as the first week of June pending final confirmation from launch provider, Arianespace. Following the launch O3b said it will start commercial service for all O3b customers on a global basis.



A Breakthrough Moment: Robert Ellicott, QC, and Greg Quintal

In the history of the Pitcairn Island people there have been critical periods which, in retrospect, required the assistance of "outsiders" to proceed. The original John Buffett may be the initial one of these people. He was the first to bring new ideas and skills Captain William Driver, who to the community. took it upon himself in 1831 to return the Islanders to Pitcairn after their disastrous five-months in Tahiti, would be another. Some 20% of the community died within that short period, mostly from influenza. It was a horrible and desperate time. Certainly Admiral of the Fleet, Fairfax Moresby, would need to be included. No one represented the interests of the Pitcairn people, in London and within the halls of the Colonial Office, more loyally than the Admiral, particularly during the years leading to the relocation of the people to Norfolk Island. This special relationship with the Admiral is reflected, among other things, in the number of sons named Fairfax or Moresby in his honour, or Fortescue, after one of his sons, well into the 20th Century. Former Australian Commonwealth Attorney General and Territories Minister, Robert Ellicott, QC, must also be on this list. He was the principal architect in 1979 of The Norfolk Island Act, which still forms the basis of the Island's government.

This commentary isn't about politics, but about the bond of trust that formed between two initial foes, Minister Ellicott and Island farmer, Greg Quintal. Greg, a sixth-generation descendant of (continued overleaf)

A Breakthrough Moment: Robert Ellicott, QC, and Greg Quintal - continued

Bounty mutineer, Mathew Quintal, was a member of the Norfolk Island Advisory Council in the 1970s and a part of the Island's negotiating team during a very bitter stage of negotiations between the Council and the Commonwealth regarding Norfolk's political future. A little-known incident occurred between them in 1978 that demonstrates what great things can happen when people of goodwill meet, even in trying times. One is now 95, the other 87, and their ensuing friendship continues to this day.

As uncertain as the future of Norfolk Island might seem today, it was probably more so during the 1970s. All politics aside (and I'll do my best), after more than a century of contention regarding the "ownership" of Norfolk—the Pitcairn Islanders arrived believing Queen Victoria had given them the Island; the Colonial Office disagreed – a 1976 Royal Commission report initiated by the Commonwealth, the Nimmo Report, essentially recommended the External Territory of Norfolk Island be absorbed into the Commonwealth. The Norfolk Council of the day rejected the report in its entirety. Particularly for Norfolk Islanders of Pitcairn-descent, a tremendous amount was at stake and emotions ran high. Add to that a couple more years of vitriolic namecalling and the stage is set for intractable negotiations between the parties with seemingly no middle ground. Enter Commonwealth Territories Minister Bob Ellicott and Norfolk Councillor Greg Quintal. The incident, told to me by someone present and confirmed by both Greg and Ellicott, is as follows:

From the Norfolk Island perspective, talks were at an all-time low, with time and resources always on the Commonwealth's side. At a particularly frustrating meeting, Greg suddenly begins to sing the hymn, "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow". This is what Norfolk Islanders sang on the shoreline in the 1930s as a much-disliked Administrator finally sailed away from the Island. It's been considered a protest song amongst Islanders of that generation ever since, Norfolk's version of "We Shall Overcome", and Greg is singing it now at the negotiating table. It helps that

Bob Ellicott turns out to be a committed Methodist. This is what I think happened.

Greg's response was so unusual, so un-Western-like, that Bob gets the sense that maybe Norfolk is different, too, and pauses to take a second look. At that moment, preconceptions disappear and political agendas momentarily vanish. At that instant, as well, Greg, Bob and the others in the room start to see each other as people, with families and histories and equal concerns about the future, rather than merely as opponents.

I don't believe it was entirely coincidence that the negotiations seemed to quickly change afterwards. News accounts of the day reveal a genuinely surprising, sudden turnabout. The controversial recommendations of the Nimmo Report were shelved by the Commonwealth in favour of entirely new legislation, *The Act*, which rightly or wrongly bestowed on a people about as much self-determination as most likely could have legally been given.

That point in time in the negotiating room I call an Ellicott moment. It could just as easily be called a Quintal moment. It is an instance of empathy and understanding between peoples that can change the course of events, and can happen at the most unlikely times and places. I think we could use such a moment now.

Statistics - 2013

In the interests of keeping the community informed and following on from last week's article, the following information from the NIPF 2013 Outcome Report is provided.

The Norfolk Island Police Force undertakes activities across four broad functional areas:

- Community policing;
- Commonwealth law enforcement (e.g. investigation of offences against Commonwealth laws, border security);
- Critical incident management and coordination (e.g. search and rescue, Emergency Management Committee participation); and
- Statutory and regulatory services (e.g. Liquor licencing, Firearms regulation, Sheriff and Bailiff duties).

All activities that we undertake (in either response or self-generated) are recorded and this allows us to determine where our activity is in most and least demand. The amount of time spent on each activity is not recorded and thus there is no time attribution to each activity. This activity analysis is not indicative of crime levels.

In 2013 Community policing activities constituted 48% of all activity, Commonwealth policing 9% of all activity, Critical incident management and coordination 1% of all activity, and Statutory and regulatory services accounted for 42% of total activity.

The below graph shows a comparison of the total activity level for 2013 against previous year totals and indicates that NIPF are continuing to work hard to provide a contemporary and relevant policing service for the Norfolk community.

Crimestoppers

Crimestoppers is a national system which can be reached on 13999 and will take information on any criminal matter. These calls are transferred through to operators off island. All Crimestoppers reports will be accepted anonymously. Police wish to reassure members of this community that any calls to Crimestoppers are made in the strictest confidence and are not subject to caller ID or subscriber tracing. Telephone calls are taken by Canberra based staff.



GOD'S INFINITE LOVE

Some of you may remember the name Jeffrey Dahmer, also known as the Milwaukee Cannibal, an American serial killer and sex offender, who committed the rape, murder and dismemberment of at least 17 men and boys over a period of 13 years. His first murder was committed when he was only 18 years old, just a few weeks after graduating from high school. This continued until his arrest on 22 July 1991, when a young man with handcuffs dangling from his wrists, escaped from Dahmer's apartment and managed to reach the police.

While investigating, the police found body parts in Dahmer's refrigerator, and he was arrested. He waived his right to have a lawyer present during questioning, and admitted to having murdered 16 young men in Wisconsin, and another in Ohio.

His trial lasted two weeks, and on 15 February 1992, Jeffrey Dahmer was found guilty of multiple murders and sentenced to 15 life sentences, and later to another 16th life sentence. On November 28, 1994, Dahmer was beaten to death by a fellow inmate at the Columbia Correctional Institution. Thus ended the life of a mass murderer and cannibal, at the age of only 34. He had served less than three years of his 16 life sentences when he died.

But there's another part to the Dahmer story that most people don't know about. When Wisconsin minister Roy Ratcliff received a phone call that an inmate at a nearby prison wanted to be baptized, he had no idea that the prisoner in question was Jeffrey Dahmer. After performing the requested baptism in 1994, Ratcliff began traveling to the prison for weekly one-hour Bible study meetings with the prisoner he had baptised, and because of his personal experiences with Dahmer the world learned of Dahmer's conversion experience.

The usual reaction from most people when they hear of this, is unbelief. Surely God could not have pardoned Jeffrey Dahmer after what he had done! Could he possibly be in heaven one day? Is it even Biblical that such a man could be forgiven by God and have eternal life with God? Well, let's look at what the Bible has to say.

We all know the verse in 1 John 1: 9, "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us of all unrighteousness". Does this verse cover all sins, even the sins of a multiple murderer like Jeffrey Dahmer?

When we look in the Bible we find many forgiven sinners, but is there someone comparable to Dahmer? 2 Kings 21 and 2 Chronicles 33 tells the story of a descendant of King David's, also a king of Judah, King Manasseh, the son of the good King Hezekiah. Not only did he make idol worship official in Israel,

but even brought these idols into God's temple. He sacrificed his children by burning them by fire as sacrifices to his idols, and had many innocent people killed, filling Jerusalem with blood. But when he was captured and taken away by the Assyrians, he turned to God, confessed his sins and pleaded that God would help him. And God, in his infinite love and mercy, did have him released and reinstated as king in Jerusalem. A totally evil man was forgiven and given back his kingdom by a loving God. This is the extent of God's love!

So it seems that Jeffrey Dahmer, in spite of being a brutal killer, has as much right to God's forgiveness as anyone of us. While I cannot judge whether Dahmer's conversion was genuine or not (only God knows that), we may well see him in heaven one day. God's love, mercy and grace are big enough to forgive any sin! How about your sins; are they forgiven? And have you forgiven those that have caused you harm? Not forgiving affects you more than the unforgiven ones, and God is able to give us the forgiveness that we lack.


CALLING AN AMBULANCE



Quilting Retreat On Norfolk Island.

Norfolk Island is an inspiring place for creativity, especially for quilt designers.

At two previous **Quiltnorfolk** Retreats wall hangings with views depicting Kingston and Captain from Cook Memorial have been the focus. This year's Retreat with Michelle Yeo has gone indoors. Eighteen months ago Michelle was on the Island teaching at a Quiltnorfolk Getaway. When she walked into St Barnabas Chapel she was overwhelmed with the designs that surrounded her and decided there and

then that she JUST HAD to incorporate them into a quilt. After her busy week of teaching at the Getaway she returned to her home in Melbourne and started a very intense design journey. It soon became obvious that there were too many designs for just one quilt so the labour turned into two large quilts. Michelle has worked from memory, from photos and done a great deal of research, and in 18 months has designed and made two fantastic quilts. For the teaching of the quilts at the Quiltnorfolk Retreat she has written out all the instructions and worked out the construction templates. Also during this time she has finished other quilts, found time (we hope) to care for her husband and three teenage children and has had published a book that has all her own patterns and instructions for her distinctive quilts. The book is published by Quilt Mania Editions and is aptly named "Of Needle Thimble and Threads". She will be going to France in two weeks time to launch the book, and to teach classes.

The Quiltnorfolk Retreat week started on Monday with Michelle revealing the two new quilts in the St Barnabas Chapel to the 18 students. The creations were a delight to behold and it didn't take any imagination to match the quilt design with the motifs in the Chapel, the most significant being the William Morris Rose Window. More information about the Chapel, it's construction, and The Melanesian Mission was given in a talk by Rick Kleiner. It was an ideal way to set the atmosphere for the students and was thoroughly appreciated by all. The ladies have been choosing colours, cutting fabric, and stitching in the St Barnabas Hall most of the week. Keep stitching ladies – hopefully you will be able to be kept warm this coming winter under a "Rose" or "Pearl" quilt, designed by Michelle Yeo and if not made - then started, on Norfolk Island. Thank you for coming and enjoying the Retreat and the Island. We look forward to seeing you again.

NEW COURSE FOR EMERGENCY SERVICES/ COMMUNITY VOLUNTEERS.

PSYCHOLOGICAL FIRST AID (PFA) TRAINING.

<u>What is PFA?</u>: PFA is an approach to helping people affected by an emergency, disaster or traumatic event. PFA aims to reduce initial distress, meet current needs, promote flexible coping and encourage adjustment by helping people to feel safe, connected to others, calm and hopeful, and by assisting them to access physical, emotional and social support.

Who can do this course?:

- Anyone who is 18 years or older and has a genuine desire to assist vulnerable and displaced people before, during and after an emergency event.
- All Emergency Services volunteers who would like more information on how to assist those you may be called on to help in times of emergency or disaster.
- You will need the ability to stay calm in an emergency, and to have access to and be able to use, the Internet (to download information and training), and be able to send and receive SMS/text messages.
- You will need to be available to do training and be available at flexible times should an emergency arise.
- Local Red Cross volunteers who undertook PFA training in November 2013 will also need to do this course to become registered with Red Cross Australia.
- You do not need to be a member of Red Cross Norfolk Island to do this course or become a Red Cross Emergency Services Volunteer, but you are always welcome to join!

<u>Where will this course take me?</u>: Subject to availability, experience and interest this course can open up opportunities to undertake additional training and assist in Emergency work away from Norfolk Island as part of the National and International Red Cross (and Red Crescent) Service.

Total Lunar Eclipse

The Earth passes directly between the Sun and the Moon on April 15, creating a total lunar eclipse.

The first stage of the eclipse starts a few minutes before 5 pm NZST, up to an hour before moonrise in New Zealand. During this penumbral stage there is little to see as the moon is only in partial shadow.

More dramatic is the Moon's entrance into the umbra, the dark inner core of Earth's shadow, where no direct sunlight reaches the lunar surface. This will start to take place just after moonrise. Few sights in astronomy are more eerie and impressive than watching this red-black shadow creeping, minute by minute, across the bright lunar landscape, slowly engulfing one crater after another. If you're so inclined, there is scientific value in carefully timing these crater crossings.

An hour or so into partial eclipse, only a final bright sliver remains outside the umbra and the rest of the Moon is already showing an eerie reddish glow. The total phase begins at 7.06 pm. From the Moon's perspective, the Sun remains completely hidden for 1 hour 18 minutes. From Earth's perspective, the lunar disk isn't completely blacked out but instead remains dimly lit by a deep orange or red glow. This seems quite unusual. The reason is this. Our atmosphere scatters and refracts (bends) sunlight that grazes the rim of our globe, so that red glow comes from all the sunrises and sunsets around Earth's terminator at the moment. If you were an astronaut standing on the Moon, you'd see Earth ringed with a thin, brilliant band of sunrise

and sunset coloured light. On rare occasions the eclipsed Moon does go black. Other times it appears a bright coppery colour. Sometimes it turns brown like chocolate, or as dark red as dried blood.

Two factors affect an eclipse's colour and brightness. The first is simply how deeply the Moon goes into the umbra; the umbra's center is much darker than its outer edge. The second is the state of Earth's atmosphere all around the terminator. If the air is very clear, the eclipse is bright; if it's mostly cloudy (or polluted with volcanic ash from a major eruption), the eclipse will be dark red, ashen gray, or almost black.

Adding to the early evening spectacle will be the bright star Spica shining only 1 or 2 degrees above the Moon and brilliant Mars about 9 degrees to the east.

Dung Beetle Project - The three CSIRO experts, Alan Dyce, Harry Standfast and Paul Ferrar, who are visiting at the present, have come on a 2-fold mission. The main reason, of cause, is to study the benefits that could be gained by the release of Dung Beetles on the island, while the other (and pointed out as equally important) is to do an insect survey with particular focus on the potentially present dung breeding midge.

This study of biting insects that could be on the island, Mr. Ferrar said, could be of great assistance in the future. "If you know what is here and how it is spreading it saves having to do another survey".

One of the interesting points brought out was the fact that insect-wise, Norfolk Island is virtually a blank page in entomological history. Mr. Dyce said that much had been done regarding the listing of Norfolk Island butterflies but only two or possibly three species of mosquito recorded on the island and very poorly represented in collections. "One of them hasn't been seen for 30, 40 or 50 years and it would be unexpected if it is still not here - if it was here then - and they are not too sure what it was!!"

Our visitors have asked us to let our readers know that apart from natural water courses, they will be looking for anything that might be a breeding spot for larvae - so if you see a red "Mini" parked on the road outside your place and three earnest looking men stalking across the paddock, poking around an old tree, don't be alarmed - it is sure to be the CSIRO team looking for larvae and who are, in their own words "conservationists at heart and interested to see whether their research will be of overall benefit to the island".

Further to the above, the following extracts will add further knowledge about Dung Beetles.

Most dung beetles are broad, squat shape and all have strong digging forelegs. Those being introduced by CSIRO are mostly 1/2 to 3/4 inches long.

The adult beetles fly actively in search of fresh dung, some species by day and some by night. They can fly for miles, and detect the dung by smell over great distances. When they land on the fresh pad they immediately burrow into it and start feeding. The mouths of the adult beetles are so formed that they can only suck the fluids of the fresh dung, and feed on nothing else. They are quite unable to chew anything, and so there is no risk that they will become pests by attacking pasture or other plants.

Walking in the Rain - We take off our hats to the Wives and Mothers, the children, the two men, Pam Matthew's golden Labrador, and escorts, who walked in the pouring rain last Sunday afternoon to raise funds for the Wives and Mothers Club.

Over a course of 7 miles the "Walkathon" commenced at the Steele's Point Tennis Club and proceeded along Stockyard Road, Collins Head Road, Queen Elizabeth Avenue right around to Peter's Highway, down Longridge Hill and along Watermill Valley, finishing at the Lime Kiln.

And it commenced to rain! And it rained and rained, right to the end of the course. Luckily, it was not cold and great was the amusement of the walkers and those who followed. The walkers did a magnificent job, finishing

by about 4.15 p.m. Ken Brown and Bob Hemus really stepped it out and finished nearly an hour before anyone else, Bob just beating Ken. There was a tremendous response to this project and to date an amount of \$1,145 has been added to the Wives and Mothers Club Building Fund.

Hospital Fees increased from 1st July - Approval has been given to the following by-laws of the Norfolk Island Public Hospital Board. With effect from 1st July, 1972 the fees to be charged to patients are hereby fixed as follows:-

Out Patients: Residents - \$1.90 per consultation

Visitors - \$3.75 per consultation

In Patients Intermediate Ward - \$18.30 per day

Private Ward -\$22.30 per day

In discussion at the last Council meeting, it was pointed out that the prudent family man would join a Medical Fund. It is an unfortunate fact, however, that a small percentage of the community will not protect themselves or their families against the possibility of big medical fees.

The Board is sympathetic to cases of genuine hardship and together with the Sunshine Club and the Administration will treat such cases with tact and discretion. But in the community's own interests, legal action against long term defaulters is necessary.

Now that the increases have been gazetted, we are pleased to report that since commencement of the articles on the position of the hospital, there has been a marked increase in the number of persons applying for membership of the M.B.F.

Letter to the Editor - "For quite some time it has been apparent that the services of a resident veterinarian would be a benefit to the island. If our Council would see fit to employ a qualified veterinarian and he would oversee the management of a quarantine station under the control of our governing Council, and complying with the world wide regulations for such a station, this might also of benefit to the island.

For one thing, Norfolk Island has the reputation of being a disease free island and we wouldn't want to spoil this.

Just so long as we do not allow any animal to come here without a disease free certification from a qualified veterinarian at the country from which the animal comes, we can pretty well guarantee that we shall maintain that reputation. But the minute we establish a quarantine station here, and accept animals who still have to be proven disease free, we severely jeopardise that reputation.

We should stop and think about this very carefully.

One can't help wondering why, if the argument that having a quarantine station in an area is such a boon to that area (and causes such an improvement, etc, etc.) Australia doesn't want to have it in her own country. Surely Australia has not suddenly been overwhelmed with so much love for Norfolk Island that she wants us to have all these wonderful benefits, instead of having them herself. The truth of the matter is that having a quarantine station in the area is a risk and an danger to the community and Australia wants us to take that risk for her". Yours etc. M. Ward.

Mental Health Week

Mental Health is characterised by having a well developed sense of self; you feel connected with yourself, your family and friends and the environmentmost of the time. And, if you feel out of sorts you can trust there is some one there available for you to reach out to, to talk to; like your Mom, or your Dad, or your partner or your wife etc. You have learnt that by talking with someone you trust you will be listened to and valued. The other person may not have the answers, but it is enough to feel heard and understood. It takes the pressure off.

Children have amazing radar; they pick up on their parents feelings and moods and what is said and unsaid. They are very good at reading emotional barcodes. It's believed that by age 6, children have tuned in so profoundly to their environment that they have 'how they will be in life' basically sorted out. In a closed family system children learn to 'bottle emotions up', that arguments, flare ups and hostility are normal and, as adults can be suspicious or cynical of anyone sharing how they feel. In an open family, children accept people expressing their feelings in an even and loving way, free of tension, judgement & hostility.

Everyone hurts and feels pain, at times. The important thing though is, has the pain healed or been buried. If the old pain is buried it will re-surface at times of tension, crisis or life event difficulty and add itself to the current level of pain. One way it can be seen if pain is not healed is when you see people with chronic addictions or acting out violently, particularly in domestic circumstances. People either want to numb pain or the pain manages them. These are old, well buried pain patterns in operation.

One of the difficulties in being raised in families where, as children, we carry others' feelings is that we grow up learning that, "I can't be ok, unless you are ok." This is called co-dependency and it creates enormous difficulties in adult relationships particularly causing guilt. Guilt is usually about a rule being broken. These guilt responses for people in codependent relationships explains why women continue to stay on in abusive relationships and why people can be so afraid of saying what they really feel for fear of hurting, burdening or enraging the other person.

Being unhappy, feeling guilty, being depressed and anxious are often characteristics of adults being raised as children in closed families where communication, expressing feelings and being listened to were not taught, or not encouraged or simply where the parents themselves had been raised in similar circumstances.

If emotional pain is treated healing is more likely. It's the same with physical pain. So, once you have decided enough is enough, you have tuned into yourself and become aware and taken an emotional stock take, then it may be a matter of assessing, "do I need to talk with dad, with mom, with my good friend, with my wife, my pastor, go to an AA or GROW meeting or see the counsellor?" - to begin to find a way of getting involved with the problem. Often problems are disguised in patterns; patterns of thinking and behaviour. This is where professional counselling can assist to help identify targets to work on, as with all of us anything we practice over and over we often incorporate into our thinking and behaviour unconsciously. If we are practiced at thinking angry thoughts it will affect our behaviour; we can be walking 'time bombs,' carrying the message 'don't talk to me.' If we think negatively we are more likely to see ourselves in a negative way; "I'm such a bad person, and nothing good ever happens to me." If we hold onto something too tightly in our minds, like certain values or beliefs, we can often be trapped into pretending everything is fine, when in fact it may not be. In these instances people are closed in their minds, are not good listeners and often are good

Ultimately it is about making choices and taking responsibility for them. It can involve setting goals, being honest, and may involve letting go of something that no longer takes care of you. Frequently it involves setting boundaries and limits on another's or one's own behaviour. It always involves nurturing ourselves healthily and not continuing with old behaviours that are destructive or harmful. What other people think is less important than what you think, and how positive you are with your self first and foremost and then with others is what counts.

NI Hapkido

One important part of Hapkido's syllabus is the use of pressure points to control or incapacitate an attacker. Based on using the same energy points that are used in accupuncture or accupressure to heal, striking or pressuring these points can render an attacker unconcious or enable the defender to control the attacker with minimal effort.

With regular training a hapkido student can control an attacker with two fingers or knock the aggressor out. Using pressure points allow a small defender to defeat a much bigger opponent.

An important advantage of pressure points is that an enemy can be overcome with out being damaged unlike punching or kicking. While extremely painful once pressure is removed the pain stops and no injury has been incurred.


