

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

KAVHA on Norfolk Island is a place with very special values. It is an historic site on a remote Pacific island with a rural setting, buildings and archaeological remains dating from Polynesian times to today. It also has natural beauty, which contributes to its heritage value and is a living heritage site with the continuing use of the buildings, open spaces and the cemetery. The current Norfolk Island community is intimately associated with its history.

This Management Plan (MP) considers the natural setting, all phases of development, all the structures and the use of the place as well as its cultural landscape and archaeology. The special character of KAVHA includes the multiple layers of convict settlement as well as its Polynesian, Pitcairn, trading, whaling, administrative and physical characteristics. This MP and other detailed plans are prepared to manage the heritage values of KAVHA. The plan analyses the history and fabric of the place as well as its intangible values which contribute to the place's heritage significance. Policies based on this significance are developed to conserve and protect the values of the place primarily based on the Australia ICOMOS Burra Charter conservation principles, processes and practice.

The illustrations, historic images and copies of historic maps are overlaid with aerial photos and current plans to permit a more accurate understanding of the place and its qualities. It is supported by a database of over 900 historic images, making them available for reference and which can be added to in the future and to record change. In 1980 historic heritage items throughout the site were identified individually with a numbering system.

The physical fabric of the place is analysed for each settlement phase and groupings of items. Associated historical materials and intangible aspects are also analysed as part of the fabric of the place. The analysis has incorporated ideas like 'cultural landscapes', 'cultural traditions' and 'cultural identity' in line with international developments in the field of cultural heritage. Traditional practices and compatible uses are integrated into this MP because they represent the cultural traditions which give the place its identity.

The primary objectives of this MP are to:

- update the previous Conservation Management Plans, to correspond with current conservation methodology and practice and synthesise the overall findings of the Landscape and Archaeological and other studies which are listed elsewhere in this report and in the bibliography.
- establish the heritage significance of the Kingston and Arthur's Vale Historic Site, including its spectacular setting.
- formulate appropriate policies for the conservation of the cultural landscape of the historic site, taking into account all aspects of its cultural and natural significance, including its significance to the Norfolk Island community, the significant physical fabric, the island setting, uses and the management of the place by the KAVHA Board.
- _ formulate appropriate policies to allow the traditional and other compatible uses of the place to continue, to allow for appropriate new uses and to minimise the detrimental impact of use.
- formulate appropriate policies for the long term conservation of the heritage significance of the place. These policies are to include future usage, including tourism, on-going maintenance and management of the cultural landscape.
- to integrate and make accessible historic and management information about the place

The MP seeks to take account of issues such as the constraints and requirements arising from the site's significance, including significant uses and adaptations. It also considers the physical condition of the buildings and their setting and the client, owner and user requirements in the development of an overall framework for the conservation and management of the place.

It is intended that this MP be a dynamic document, added to on a regular basis to allow for the integration of new information and recording of maintenance. This should include the updating of historical information as new information from archival research or oral histories comes to light.

Assembly Members speak to the People

Since the inauguration of the Legislative Assembly, Members have made themselves available to answer questions, posed by members of the public, utilising the facilities of Radio VL2NI.

On Thursday this week, the Chief Minister Andre Nobbs, together with his Ministers, Mrs. Vicki Jack, Geoff Gardner and Chris Magri all spoke about the portfolios under their control

Mrs. Vicki Jack was the first to speak and said the best place to start, would be about KAVHA as she was meeting with the land holders later in the day. She said the KAVHA CMP is now open for public submission and it can be down-loaded from the Attorney-General's Department website <www.ag.gov.au/kavhamp>.

The other aspect which was pleasing for the land holders in KAVHA was the lifting of the moratorium from the Crown lease instructions and this is now going to allow the land holder to apply to the Administrator to seek variance to the tenure of their lease. To expand it from 28 year to 99 year and in some cases to change the description of the lease. For example to change it from a 'special use agricultural lease' to a 'rural residential lease'.

It will be on a case by case basis, and the change of lease does not guarantee the approval of any development application but it is a lull in the process and gives some hope. It is certainly an improvement in the situation for certain land holders in KAVHA.

Who has the say if a [development] application is made. Is it the Norfolk Island Government or the Commonwealth?

I am the sign-off Minister, but because their could be a 'significant impact' which is the over-riding phrase within EPBC Act, they would also get referral to the KAVHA Board for a recommendation and it may make it to the Australian Minister. It is a case by case aspect but it gives some hope.

Other things which are happening within my area

- Social Welfare initiating some changes and policies within the Social Welfare system. We hope to initiate some new policies and the community will be advised of these changes.
- Education The Memorandum of Understanding is almost complete.
- Environment There are a lot of issues. However, there will be a video teleconference between our Environment officer and members of the Environment Natural Heritage Trust Fund to clarify some funding for geckos, Argentine ants, the final stage of the hydrology study and the glass crusher.
- The Minister said that she believed that the Asian House gecko is now fairly widespread on the island. The endemic gecko is under threat and she stressed the need for residents visiting Nepean and Phillip to ensure that they did not accidentally carry geckos to either of these islands.
- The importation of fresh fruit, particularly apples. General consensus is getting close to the protocols. There is another alternative being studied and that is the importation of fresh fruit sliced, peeled and

- packed in vacuum sealed bags. This product is treated with lemon juice (citric acid).
- The Administration v. SMEC has been finalised but what is finally being finalised is the amount of compensation or the amount of tax costs. We expect the final amount to be resolved over the next couple of weeks.

Geoff Gardener, Minister for Tourism and Health said:-

- There seems to be some unusual trends in the arrival figures and statistics. A study of past figures needs to be studied to see if the 25% of visitors out of New Zealand constitute a 'home stay' segment of the island's tourist market and what needs to be done to adapt to this.
- The new Board and the new Budget reflects the island's commitment to become more active in the New Zealand market. The recent recruitment of Mike Hogan and Associates and the recent visits by members of the Tourist Board have resulted in very positive feed-back, even from Air New Zealand Holidays. It is to early yet to say that the decline in visitor numbers has been reversed, but indications are very positive.
- In the area of Health, a proposal is being studied for the establishment of a Home Care system on the island. This would expand some of the home nursing services for health monitoring of aged and infirm patients on a regular basis. This expansion could enable people to remain in their own homes by maybe looking at providing additional services such as home help and domestic assistance etc. As the Minister said "we have an ageing population and we can't let that slip under the radar. It is something we have to address".
- The staff at the Hospital do a wonderful job but what makes it difficult is when people don't pay their bills. It is important that to maintain the level of services that we have that people meet their obligations as far as paying for their services as best they can. "If there are difficulties" Geoff said "for goodness sake get in touch with the Director and don't just ignore them."

Chris Magri, Minister for Commerce

- On the question of Social Welfare, Chris said that the long-term goal for the Government is to introduce a local superannuation scheme to try and make sure that we can continue to provide an adequate and affordable social welfare system. After months of study he is now in a position to instruct the Legal Services unit to start developing legislation along those lines.
- Roads and rain don't mix and the proposed roads programme has been really upset. It is hoped that with some fine weather, the roads programme can be achieved.
- Although Norfolk Island has a Fisheries Management Plan, there are obligations to the AFMA (the Australian Fisheries Management Authority), under a Memorandum of Understanding to provide fish catch data etc. As AFMA is the management authority for the fisheries around Norfolk, we have to meet our obligations and to try and

develop a local community-based management plan. A discussion paper has been endorsed by the Norfolk Island Fishing Association to proceed with the development of this plan and it is about 85% towards completion.

Chief Minister Andre Nobbs -

Is it true that the Chief Minister asked to abolish the Administrator's position on Norfolk Island and if

On the question of the Administrator's position, the Executive met and discussed that [subject]. We also recognised that the new Australian Government was reviewing all positions within its own framework. To give you an example, we are in Bob Debus's portfolio and within that is the Australian Capital Territory (ACT) and the Northern Territory. They are currently at the moment highlighted for Constitutional review. ACT has no Administrator, so we are just being a 'bit on the ball' in terms as to how things may go in the future.

We suggested that Norfolk Island and the Australian Government may be better served by the position being filled by a senior officer. That removes the very expensive option of the Administrator.

Our current Acting Administrator [Owen Walsh] who is a senior officer acting in this role, is doing an exemplary job, dealing with the Norfolk Island Government and the community and he is maintaining clear communications with the Australian Government. They are great things for us and I would personally say I feel our communications through the Administrator's office have improved 100%.

Owen also has the background of a senior officer to understand many of the intricacies of legislative and legal issues and he can be relied upon to act for both governments in an apolitical fashion.

Does the Minister feel it is productive to carry on with the proposed Enterprise Agreement when 191 public servants voted for PSA representation and 187 public servants voted against the Enterprise Agreement?

I will answer that on a number of levels. In terms [as to] whether we should cancel the process, the Public Service Management Act requires it to go to its completion, that's within the law. In terms of the signatories on the paper that is referred to, I have had meetings with the PSA to discuss how things were going with the Enterprise bargaining. During those discussions I said if you would like to use those signatures as a lever and throw some ideas at us in terms of other outcomes you would like to see [come] out of this negotiation process, by all means do so. With those numbers on the paper, you obviously have some leverage. I have had further discussions with various PSA executives following that, and talked to them about a number of options that they may have within the negotiation process.

Just to highlight what the intent was in terms of a purpose for the Enterprise Agreement coming about, it was to satisfy the pay situation within the public service. This hasn't been addressed for some time and (continued overleaf)

is something the Government is keen to come to some satisfactory arrangement. We have made a commitment to that within last year's Budget and we will make a further commitment to that. We want to satisfy the pay situation so that we retain the personnel we have and the jobs are satisfying. We want to provide as much equity as possible out of the bargaining.

We want to enable flexitime arrangements, provide a bit more job satisfaction; begin a process of cooperative enhancement of the public service in a range of areas and also provide outcomes that the Norfolk Island community could see a benefit as well. What we proposed was an entire package rather than it just being 'here's an adjustment to your pay'.

It is a two way situation. We probably haven't communicated as a Government and through the Administration, all the avenues, and we have ended up with a document that was, in some areas, too formal. I would still like to see some negotiation, but I am not actually sure whether that is still possible at this stage.

But I can't halt the process just because there's signatures on a bit of paper.

Are ICAC and the Ombudsman still coming to Norfolk. If so, when do they arrive and who will they be meeting with?

As most people will be aware this is one of the things that I committed to in terms of giving people some social justice options as well as putting confidence back in the methodology we use in our governance. We have been pursuing the Ombudsman's office to have a connection with Norfolk. Peter Maywald, who is a former employee of the Ombudsman's office, has been using all manner of techniques to try and get us whether it be a 'fee for service' type of arrangement, or whatever can be formulated. There has been some opposition through current legislation in Australia, particularly in regard to NSW with the Ombudsman Act.

In terms of ICAC, we have been negotiating with the Commissioner to come. He is still to give us some information as to timing. It is a scoping visit and we have already asked if they would be available to meet community members. We have not had a response as to whether that would fit into their schedule or programme.

The visit is definitely going to happen. It is something I would like to see so we can get on with our jobs. As you know there's always some healthy or unhealthy rumours flying about. The Assembly walks a fine line of either doing nothing or doing everything and it is all going in our pockets. I would like to see some of these rumours put to bed once and for all.

What I would like to see is an on-going and regular ICAC communication with Norfolk after that.

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Sale of Food (Amendment) Act 2008

At last Wednesday's Legislative Assembly meeting, Chris Magri, Minister for Commerce and Industry introduced an amendment to the Sale of Food Act with the following.

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM

This Bill is intended to provide information and protection to consumers of fresh fish.

In order to avoid mis-labelling of fish and to assure persons who wish to consume fish that has been caught in Norfolk Island waters, the Bill requires that fresh fish (that is defined as including frozen fish and molluscs and crustaceans) be labelled as to its type in accordance with regulation and as to the country of its source.

In order to provide some protection of quality and safety fish must also be labelled, if it has been frozen and thawed, when it was thawed.

Breach of the new provisions is dealt with in the existing legislation that provides for penalties for breaches of its various provisions, which will include these amendments.

The Bill also provides for the making of Regulations to give effect to its provisions.

If the Assembly approves this Bill, I will issue drafting instructions for Regulations setting out the inspection and enforcement procedures to be applied. Naturally, these measures will not be successful unless there is appropriate community education and proper enforcement of the legislation.

While I do not envisage that this will involve significant expenditure, if the Bill succeeds I will ensure that the budget now in preparation will include sufficient funding for the specialist training of existing sale of food inspectors so that they can identify the

various species of fish and be able to inform local fishing operators and retail food outlets of their obligations.

I will also organise a low-cost community education programme to inform consumers and fishing industry stake holders of the new protections and procedures.

Norfolk's 58 unnamed Roads to be "Christened"

"Members may be surprised to know that there are 58 roads in Norfolk Island that have no names, or at least no names that are officially recognised". Chris Magri, Minister for Commerce and Industry revealed tis information when he informed the Legislative Assembly on Wednesday that he was working with the Registrar to begin the process of naming these roads.

"I believe" he said, "that it is worth the effort to give names to each of these roads to assist us all to find addresses and in particular, to facilitate access in emergency situations such as accidents, serious health matters or fires.

Most of these roads are on Commonwealth crown land, while the other private roads would need to be dedicated as public roads prior to having them named. The approximate cost of road signage for these would be \$14,500.

I am grateful to the Registrar, who has prepared a detailed paper setting out a suggested process for naming these roads, and has put considerable time into researching appropriate names. The recommended names have been obtained using historical data, current names or known names, or the names of prominent persons associated with the area or road.

It is proposed that a public information session be conducted to provide for public comment in respect of the proposed names, following which choices of names for these 58 roads can be finalised.

A resolution of the Assembly will then be required as to the proposed names so that a recommendation may be made to the Administrator to in turn advise the Surveyor General of the name as prescribed under the Official Survey Act.

I have circulated a paper to Members identifying the unnamed roads and some of the suggested names. In this paper, the road identification number correlates to the Official Survey plan. I would welcome feedback from Members and the community on the suggested names or on alternative names which they might consider to be more appropriate".

The Chief Minister continued - "A number of the major goals of the strategic plan have already been achieved, and there has been significant progress on most of the others. The Administration CEO and managers are now incorporating the goals and strategies into their new business plans and into the 2008/09 Budget now in preparation. This will ensure that the major goals identified in the Strategic Plan will result in achievable and fully funded programmes across the wide range of services provided for the community by the Administration and statutory bodies.

I presented the Strategic Plan to the Commonwealth Minister for Home Affairs, Hon Bob Debus MP, at our meeting in Canberra on 8th February, and provided him with a briefing on the major areas where we are seeking change and improvement. This briefing was complemented by my Ministerial colleagues Mrs. Vicky Jack and Mr. Neville Christian, who provided the Minister with more detail on their portfolio areas.

I can only say that the Strategic Plan and our briefings were received in a very positive and enthusiastic spirit by Mr. Debus. He was clearly pleased with the wide scope of the plan and the detail of the strategies. Presenting the Strategic Plan at our first face-to-face meeting has started our relationship on a good footing and I look forward to much positive communication with Mr. Debus in future".



'B' division Men - Jim Olsson, Geoff Leary and John Hughes. 'B' Division Ladies - Joy Evans, Daphne Pirie and Johanna Lisner. 'C' division Men - Terry Goff 368, Trevor Tripp and Gordon Hewlett. 'C' division Ladies - Joyce Dyer, Erica Griffiths and Kay Farnsworth.

Over the years this annual golf event has grown in popularity and on Monday evening 18th February, I had the pleasure of attending the Official Welcome to those who are competing in this year's Tournament.

In her welcome, Joy Evans, Chairperson of the Veteran's Golf Committee, welcomed all to the Tournament of which Air New Zealand is the major sponsor. Other local sub-sponsors of the Tournament are-Burnt Pine Travel, Sea World Restaurant, Frank's Shoes, Governor's Restaurant, Homestead Restaurant, Pete's Place, Dino's Restaurant, Casa Kui Jewellers, Hilli Restaurant & Wine Bar, Surf Style.NF, Emily Bay Boutique, Max's Duty Free, Two Chimneys Winery, Jendi Boutique, Expression Beauty Salon, Norfolk Touring, South Pacific Resort, Ross's on Norfolk, Cascade Motors, The Olive Cafe, N.I. She pointed out that the 2008 Tournament had attracted the second biggest field of competitors (136) in its 17 year history. 142 is the maximum number of players that the course can accommodate, and this figure had been reached in the 1990's.

President Reece Walden welcomed the regular visitors from Foster/Tuncurry, Sandgate, Cronulla and gave a special welcome to the team from Townsville and those who were here for the first time.

In her introduction to the Hon. Geoff Gardner, Minister for Sport, who officially opened the Tournament, Joy gave a brief overview of Geoff's sporting achievements. "For many, many years" she said "he has competed nationally and internationally in Athletics. When he retired he was voted in as President of the IAAF for the Oceania region. I think this is a great honour for someone from this small island".

"It is wonderful to see so many faces here" Geoff said. "and it is great to see the contingent from Townsville".

He complimented the Norfolk Island Golf Club on how they are able to prepare the course so magnificently for the tournaments they run throughout the year.

Geoff made special mention of the work done by green keeper Simon Bigg and his new apprentice Shane Evans. As part of his apprenticeship, Shane had been sent up country to locate some 'elbow grease'!

"The point of that" Geoff said "is that it takes a lot of elbow grease to polish a course up like this, and congratulations to everyone.

"Veterans' sport has always been a big part of Norfolk Island tourism. Tourism is one of my other portfolios, and we are very conscious of the contribution that veteran sports men and women make to Norfolk Island. I have been working with Reece to put together a package that will support all sporting organisations in Norfolk Island which will really recognise the integral part they play in tourism promotion on Norfolk Island. Hopefully over the next few months we will be able to announce some initiatives where the Government will be able to provide significant support to all sporting organisations to assist them in their promotion and marketing.

"Certainly the major contributor to our tourism market is word of mouth, and we certainly hope that during your week here on the island you have an absolute ball. You can make a contribution to help repeat all of these events in Norfolk Island by your support of our wonderful sponsors. As was pointed out, we have 21 sub-sponsors this year on top of Air New Zealand's sponsorship - a tremendous effort from the local community and a recognition of the value they place on sports-based tourism on Norfolk Island".

Geoff concluded his remarks with a mention of the Life Members of the club who he said all fall into the Veteran's league. He then made some disparaging remarks about the magnificent and glorious air shot that the writer of this article (one of the Life Members mentioned above), when I endeavoured to hit the first shot to open the golfing season two years ago!



Firstly, thank you to everyone for the feedback on our first Market Intell and for the numerous invitations to discuss the state of tourism on NI over coffee. I will get around to catching up with all of you over the coming weeks.

This Market Intell provides a bit of a change in focus. As part of the Brand Development that will be commenced over the coming weeks, we will need to be identifying our competitors and our strengths against them. To begin this process, I will continue to collect and distribute snippets of what is happening in our world, ie the world where our current, and potential, visitors decide on what destinations to visit.

Who our competitors are depends on the market segment we are talking about but my thinking as to who our competitors are at this time is:

History / Culture Tasmania, Emerging South East Asia – Vietnam, Cambodia, Indonesia

Environment New Zealand, Numerous Australian destinations, South Pacific, Vanuatu, Samoa, New Caledonia, Fiji and Cook Islands

The overall idea is to get everyone thinking about the world we are operating in. Please let me know if you would like me to add any other destinations to the competitor list.

Competitor Activity Fiii

Fiji's Plantation Island Resort has released a year-round family deal leading in at \$1399 per adult and \$399 per child ex BNE, for 5 days at the resort including air fares and meals. The special is valid for bookings to 29 Feb, for travel until 24 Dec 08 including school holidays, and also includes two nights at Nadi's Raffles Gateway plus transfers. Price ex MEL is \$1599 and ex SYD its \$1499.

Levuka Town has been selected to be nominated Fiji's first World Heritage site. Levuka is the capital of Ovalau, an island off the eastern shore of Fiji's Viti Levu. The waterfront town (pop. 3,745) was the first European settlement in Fiji. Among its many historic structures is the 130-year-old Royal Hotel, thought to be the oldest operating hotel in the Pacific. Fiji's Department of Culture and Heritage, in association with the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), is working on the World Heritage project.

Fiji Happy with Aussie Record Arrivals Australia has produced record tourist arrivals of 198,220 for Fiji for the calendar year 2007, an increase of 0.24 per cent on 2006. New Zealand arrivals were 100,278, down -7.45 per cent on 2006 and Australia and New Zealand are respectively Fiji's biggest tourist markets worldwide. In other markets, the Americas (the United States and Canada) slipped -0.2 per cent.

According to the regional director Australia for the Fiji Islands Visitors Bureau, Paresh Pant, the overall performance was excellent given that for most of 2007 Fiji was in a recovery mode after 2006's military coup. "While the Australian figures are especially pleasing, cumulatively the market share from these markets was 70.31 per cent for 2007 versus 71.12 per cent in 2006," Mr Pant said. "Collectively Australia and New Zealand account for more than 55 per cent of Fiji's visitors overall."

New Caledonia

Public health authorities are considering the current health situation as a "pre-epidemic" stage for hemorrhagic, mosquito-transmitted dengue fever with 15 new cases detected since Jan. 1 in Nouméa and its immediate suburbs. They said the January figures were of particular concern because there were only 47 cases reported for all of last year. (Source: Marianas Variety)...

New Zealand launches new tourism strategy through to 2015 New Zealand's new Tourism Strategy 2015 was recently launched by Prime Minister, Rt. Hon.Helen Clark. Vision

The vision of the NZ Tourism Strategy 2015 is:

"In 2015, tourism is a valued as the leading contributor to a sustainable New Zealand economy"

Outcomes

To guide the tourism industry towards its vision, the Strategy contains four outcomes

- New Zealand delivers a world-class visitor experience
- New Zealand's tourism sector is prosperous and attracts ongoing investment
- 3. The tourism sector takes a leading role in protecting and enhancing the environment
- 4. The Tourism sector and communities work together for mutual benefit

NZ Outbound Stat's for December Quarter 2007 The number of New Zealand residents leaving on short-term overseas trips rose 5% on Dec 06 to 199,700 and, interestingly, almost 40% of the increase was attributed to cruise trips. The Dec quarter saw resident departures climb 8%, and for the calendar year the increase was 6% to 1.98 million.

Latest Strategic Tourism Plan for Tasmania

The Tasmanian Government and the tourism industry recently completed a three-year strategic business plan to take advantage of the growth opportunities, said Minister for Tourism, Arts and the Environment, Paula Wriedt, Tourism 21: Strategic Business Plan 2007-2010 is the fifth update of a major plan first launched 10 years ago that committed the State Government and industry to precise targets, strategies and deadlines.

The inaugural plan in June 1997 was a landmark event. The industry then was made up of about 1300 tourism business. There were less than 500,000 visitor arrivals, and their total spending was around \$585 million.

Since then Tasmania has witnessed extraordinary growth, resulting in about 2,400 tourism businesses in Tasmania today. Around 870,000 visitors are also visiting the state every year and spending just over \$2 billion.

The new plan takes the Tasmanian Government and industry through to 2010, and paves the way for significant growth over the next three years. It also provides longer-term projections of where the industry could be in 10 years. It particularly explains how the industry is expected to be influenced over the next 10 years by new technology, which is impacting on the way we do business and people's perceptions of the world, said Minister Wriedt said. Tasmania is endeavouring to stay one step ahead of these challenges and creating opportunities for itself as it moves forward, the Minister added. To achieve this, Tourism Tasmania and the Tasmanian tourism industry have agreed to focus on four core strategies:

Create a highly desirable destination Market the destination effectively

Make it easy to travel to and within Tasmania,

Deliver on that promise.

The plan covers issues of access to and from Tasmania, travel distribution, the internet, climate change, and the challenge of connecting with potential travellers. It also includes specific activities to be carried out by Tourism Tasmania and by Tourism Industry Council Tasmania to achieve the new targets within this new Plan. "The new targets focus on growth in domestic and international market share and, for the first time, targets for growing the number of Tasmanians holidaying in their own state. Minister Wriedt said two historic milestones of one million visitors and \$2.2 billion of visitor spending are expected be achieved during the course of the new three-year strategic plan. "How soon each milestone is reached will depend on the continuing positive relations and collaboration between the Tasmanian government and tourism industry," the Minister said.

World Heritage Nomination For Prison

Western Australia's Housing and Works and Heritage Minister Michelle Roberts has welcomed the announcement by Federal Environment, Heritage and Arts Minister Peter Garrett, that Fremantle Prison would be nominated for the World Heritage List.

"Fremantle prison is a priceless part of Western Australia's history," Mrs Roberts said. "In the past 12 months, more than 175,000 people have visited the historic prison."

The Minister said Mr Garrett's announcement started a wonderful journey for Fremantle prison as part of the serial nomination of Australian convict sites. The State Government recognises the importance of the historic prison, spending \$2-million to restore the western elevation of the main cell block to its original built form. "It is a fantastic asset to the State and to the nation," Mrs Roberts said. "Now we hope that the world will see it that way too."

Market Trends

Social Consciousness Continues to Shape Travel

Choices

Social consciousness, including environmental issues, was a hot topic in 2007, and according to a recent Travelocity poll, the trend among travelers shows no sign of slowing down in 2008.

"There are limitless opportunities to minimize the negative impact of our travels and even improve the locales we visit," said Genevieve Shaw Brown, Travelocity's senior editor. "We want to inform travelers about all the possibilities so individuals can participate at a level that works for them."

Choices Range from Carbon Offset Purchase to Volunteer Vacation Options range from something as simple as a one-click carbon offset purchase to immersing yourself completely in a volunteer vacation. Ms. Brown said although many travelers are aware of these options, there is a huge range of opportunities that fall somewhere in the middle. "Choosing to add on one day of volunteering to your vacation or doing a bit of research to find an eco-friendly resort are simple things socially conscious travelers can do."

A few additional statistics include:

- Of the nearly 80% willing to spend more money on an eco-friendly destination or business, responses ranged from \$25 (€17) to more than \$200 (€135) more. The largest group of respondents (23%) said they would be willing to spend \$51-\$100 (€34-€68) more
- Of respondents who indicated they're planning on volunteering in 2008, 33% said conservation and the environment are the causes these people are most likely to donate time to.
- Healthcare and education also came in near the top of the list.
- Respondents are nearly as likely to volunteer in the U.S. as abroad. (Source: ehotelier.com)

Australian Departures 10 year high

DEC 2007 saw 478,000 short term resident departures, making it the biggest month for outbound travel in the last ten years. Australian Bureau of Statistics figures released yesterday showed that New Zealand continued to be the most popular destination, with 16.5% of travellers visiting, up from 13.9% in 1997. The market share of the USA and UK have both fallen significantly over the last decade to 8.8% and 7.8% respectively, with travel to Thailand and China more than doubling over the same period. Indonesia also fell from 10.6% to 5.2% of the total, showing the major effect of the Bali bombings. Hong Kong's Australian market share fell to 3.8%, with Singapore increasing to 4.1% of departures.



Foundation Day 1788-2008

Preparations continue for next months Foundation Day celebrations on Thursday 6th March which may well be the best yet – Pinetrees Tours luncheon following the Re-enactment is now fully booked however the under 17's Netball Representative Squad will be selling fresh sandwiches and cold drinks from 11.00 am on the day for those arriving early to secure the best spots to watch the midday re-enactment in Emily Bay. Should be a great day for all and a great opportunity to support the girls off to represent the island in netball mid year.

The following is the first part of a summary of the events, which led up to the 1st European settlement on Norfolk Island 220 years ago.

In an effort to move undesirable inmates from His Majesty's prisons in England, the First Fleet was formed under the command of Captain Arthur Phillip, to set out and settle Botany Bay. The fleet comprised of the flagship Sirius, the armed tender Supply and nine transports and store ships.

Captain Phillip's instructions from King George III contained this passage:- "Norfolk Island.....being represented as a spot which may hereafter become useful, you are, as soon as circumstances will admit of it, to send a small establishment thither to secure the same to us, and prevent it being occupied by the subjects of any other European power".

On 15th February 1788, the armed tender Supply, commanded by Lieutenant, Henry Lidgbird Ball, left Sydney Cove for Norfolk Island.

Governor Philips chose as commander of this expedition, an officer who was well know to him - Lieutenant Philip Gidley King. King's companions numbered 23. The ship's surgeon chose six female convicts "whose characters stood fairest". Nine male convicts and eight free men were chosen whose ages ranged from 16 to 72 years. Richard Widdicombe, the oldest of the men, had been a farmer who was convicted for stealing one wooden winch and other goods, value 4 guineas'. He was given a sentence of seven years transportation. At 14 years of age Charles McLennan, was the youngest of the male convicts. He had been found guilty and sentenced to seven years transportation for the crime of 'stealing a bladder purse, value one penny, one gold half-guinea, one half-crown, and six pennies'. They also took a few domestic animals and fowls, tents, clothing, farm and flax-dressing tools and other equipment......to be continued next week.

POLICE NEWS

Obtaining Your Learner's Permit And Driver's Licence

There appears to be some misunderstanding in the community regarding the process for obtaining Learner's Permits and Driver's Licences. Details of the process are as follows:

- 1. You must be at least 15 years old to apply for a motorcycle learner's permit, and at least 16 years old to apply for a motor vehicle learner's permit.
- 2. Obtain a Norfolk Island Traffic Handbook from the Police station which you will need to study in order to complete the theory exam.
- 3. Contact Police and arrange a time to do the theory exam. For learner's permits (both vehicle and motorcycle) you need to successfully complete a theory exam and an eyesight test.
- 4. Police will then provide you with a document which you are required to present to the Registrar in Kingston where you pay \$11 for your learner's permit. *You do not have a valid learner's permit until payment is made and the permit is issued.* For a motor vehicle licence, the learner's permit is valid for a period of 3 months from the date of issue. (For a motorcycle, the learner's permit remains valid until you obtain your full motor vehicle licence after you have turned 16 years of age).
- 5. Within the next 3 months, when you feel confident that you can pass the motor vehicle test, contact Police and arrange a time to undergo testing for your full licence. *You must present a valid motor vehicle learner's permit at this time.*To obtain your full motor vehicle licence, you need to successfully complete the theory exam, a practical driving test, and an eyesight test.
- 6. Upon successful completion of the test, you will again be provided with a document which needs to be presented to the Registrar for payment. (\$33 for 3 years). The Registrar cannot issue you with your full licence until you have held a motor vehicle learner's permit for not less than 3 months, even though you may have successfully completed the testing process. Until you are issued with your full motor vehicle licence, you are still classified as a learner driver, and must therefore be accompanied by a licenced driver whilst driving. Once you are issued with a full motor vehicle licence, you are then considered to be fully licenced for both motor vehicles and motorcycles.

"Seed to Elegance" Kentia Palms of Norfolk Island, South Pacific

You don't often hear about a father and his daughter combining their knowledge and expertise to produce a book. However, this week I received a copy of the book "Seed to Elegance" which is the culmination of the combined efforts of Kevin Williams (affectionately known to all on Norfolk as "Rowdie") and his charming daughter, Jodie.

This attractive 72-page book is dedicated to Gerald Goudie, who for many years was a resident of the Island. He was Kevin's mentor when he first began growing and exporting Kentia Palms from Norfolk.

The book is divided into 3 sections - Origins- which traces the history of Norfolk Island; the discovery of the palms in 1869 by Charles Moore, director of the Royal Botanical Garden in Sydney who made a brief visit to Lord Howe Island. Moore singled out two palms - Kentia Belmoreana and Kentia Fosteriana. Samples were sent to Sir Joseph Hooker, curator of England's Royal Botanical Gardens at Kew. Hooker was well aware of the potential commercial possibilities of successfully introducing into the British market a previously unknown plant from a distant part of the Empire.

Moore's letters to the 'Gardener's Chronicle', England's premier gardening journal with a readership of thousands, resulted in those in a position to afford such luxury, turned to English nurserymen for supplies of the plant.

In 1878 the New South Wales Government appointed Captain R.R. Armstrong, R.N. as Forest Ranger to Lord Howe Island and he is credited with establishing the Kentia Palm seed industry on the Island. The first local Islander to begin exporting Kentia seeds on a regular basis from Lord Howe was Mr. T.B. Wilson.

Wilson arrived on Lord Howe in 1878 and brought with him a quantity of Norfolk Island Pine Seeds which he had obtained during a brief stop-over. In 1881 Wilson and his wife went on a visit to New Zealand and the vessel in which they were travelling made a port call at Norfolk. Knowing in advance that this stop-over would take place, Wilson took with him a quantity of Kentia Palm seeds as repayment for the Norfolk Island Pine seeds he had brought into Lord Howe.

This friendly exchange of seeds is the first recorded mention of the introduction of these plants into their respective islands. The book then goes on to explore the arrival of the Kentia seeds into Europe and as they became more popular, into North America. One group of greenhouse growers was the DeClerq family from Ghent, Belgium who began importing Kentia seed as early as 1898.

Lord Howe Island had established itself as the main producer of Kentia Palm seed in the early 1900's, but smaller quantities of seed were also becoming available from Australia and Norfolk Island. The Evans and Chapman families of Norfolk were the main Kentia seed pickers and exporters in the early days.

Once introduced into Europe, the Kentia Palm was immediately recognised as remarkable for its dramatic appearance and ability to readily flourish indoors. The prohibitive cost factor resulted in Kentia Palms becoming famous house plants among the nobility and aristocracy of Europe. There are many pictures in the book showing Kentias in the Strand Palace, Winter

Garden; "Sandringham", King Edward VII and Queen Alexandria's country residence; the Grand Staircase, Buckingham Palace and the Waterloo Chamber, Windsor Castle.


Before long wealthy Americans began emulating rich Europeans in seeking access to this graceful ornamental plant. Fashionable hotels were also beginning to display beautiful Kentias in their reception and dining areas.

I found the most interesting section of the book- "The Vision of Ivens 'Pullis' Nobbs. Here is an extract from that particular section - "During World War Two, Pullis, while serving with the Australian Armed Forces in North Africa, saw Kentia Palms displayed as decorative plants in various luxury hotels. He was aware that his father had planted twelve tall trees on the family property from the original seed that T.B. Wilson had brought into Norfolk Island. He believed that the seed harvested from those and other Kentia trees on Norfolk Island could have become the finished product that he saw in North Africa. A vision of his own Kentia Palm plantation on Norfolk Island was born.

He cleared his land using hard manual labour and discovered that he needed more seed. He decided to make a trip to Lord Howe and, as T.B. Wilson had done in the previous century, traded Norfolk Island Pine seed for Kentia Palm seed.

Although he did not live to see his plantation (the largest on Norfolk Island), reach its full potential, Pullis is recognised as the pioneer of the Kentia industry on Norfolk Island. He was instrumental in its expansion through his encouragement of other Islanders and residents to also cultivate Kentia Palms". There are many more interesting and fascinating stories about Kentia Palms.

Kevin, who now lives in Hartford, Michigan, USA still carries on with the cultivation and sale of these palms through his company, South Seas Palm Company. He sells many plants on 'ebay' and with each sale he encloses a copy of the book 'Seed to



Elegance'. So apart from receiving many congratulatory messages from his satisfied customers, the book helps promote Norfolk Island to the people of North America who would have to be impressed by the following quotation:- "Today, grand locations such as opulent hotels, elegant shops and restaurants, luxurious cruise ships, upscale offices and lavish homes effectively display Norfolk's bold Kentias. Across the world the impression of understated elegance is confidently expressed, as it has been for nearly 125 years".

Bleeding

Most small cuts don't present any damage to the average victim. But bleeding from large cuts may require immediate medical treatment. Depending on the type of wound and its location, there can be damage to nerves and tendons.

Minor Bleeding from small cuts.

- Rinse the wound thoroughly with water to clean out dirt and debris.
- Then wash the wound with a mild soap and rinse thoroughly. [For wounds, it isn't necessary to use an antiseptic solution to prevent infection, and some can cause allergic reactions]
- Cover the wound with a sterile gauze and adhesive tape.
- Examine the wound daily. If the bandage gets wet, remove if and apply a new one. After the wound forms a scab, a bandage is no longer necessary.
- Seek medical attention if the wound becomes red, swollen, tender, warm, or draining pus.

Bleeding from a large cuts.

- Wash the wound thoroughly with water. This will allow you to see the wound clearly and assess its size
- Place a piece of sterile gauze or a clean cloth over the entire wound. If available use clean latex or rubber gloves to protect yourself from exposure to possible infection from the blood of a victim unknown to you. If you can, raise the bleeding body part above the level of the victims heart. DO NOT apply a tourniquet.

- Using the palm of your hand on the gauze or cloth, apply steady, direct pressure to the wound for 5 minutes. [During the 5 minutes, do not stop to check the wound or remove blood clots that may form on the gauze].
- If blood soaks through the gauze, do not remove it. Appy another gauze pad on top and continue applying pressure.
- Call for or seek immediate medical attention for all large cuts or lacerations, or if:
 - 1. You're unable to stop the bleeding after 5 minutes of pressure, or if the wound begins to bleed again [continue to apply pressure until you get to the hospital]
 - 2. You're unable to clean out the dirt and debris thoroughly, or there's something else stuck in the wound.
 - 3. The wound is on the face or neck.
 - 4. The injury was caused by an animal or human bite, burn, electrical injury, or puncture wound [e.g.a nail].
 - 5. The cut is more than 2 cm long or appears deep, large or deep wounds can result in nerve or tendon damage.

If you have any doubt in whether stitches are need, seek medical advise.

- Give the name of the patient if known [this is important on Norfolk as the hospital will have records of that person]
- State if any other emergency service is required eg. Police, Cliff rescue etc.
- Do NOT hang up till the hospital hangs up they may have other questions they would like to ask.

Ban young children from watching T.V., says doctor

Pre-school children should not be allowed to watch television or play with computers, a leading expert and author has claimed. Dr Aric Sigman wants to see parents and teachers encouraged to enforce an early years buffer zone that would ban all electronic media to protect developing brains. Separately, hundreds of thousands of schoolchildren never play outside, according to research commissioned by the Scout Association.

Tests on hair could detect breast cancer

Work is being done on a technique that will enable women to soon be tested for breast cancer through the strands of their hair. The new screening method uses a sample of hair that is exposed to a high-powered X-ray beam in a synchrotron - a 3D scanner that can detail objects as fine as 1,000th of a millimetre.

Tobacco Use

Tobacco use could kill a billion people this century unless governments act now to reduce smoking, the U.N. said yesterday. In a strongly-worded report the World Health Organisation, the U.N.'s public health arm, said no country was doing all it could to curb tobacco use, which is set to kill 500 million of the world's current population and a further 500 million over in the course of the century

You're never too old

You're never too old to reap the benefits of a healthy lifestyle, say researchers who found that doing things such as exercising and not smoking at 70 greatly raises one's chances of living to 90. The researchers focused on what people could do in their senior years to live longer while maintaining good health and physical function -- a vital issue as the population ages. For 25 years, they tracked about 2400 male doctors whose average age was 72 when they entered the study in the early 1980s. Those who exercised two to four times per week, did not smoke, maintained normal body weight and blood pressure, and avoided diabetes had a 54 per cent chance of living to 90. Doing any one or combination of them also was beneficial. But men who did none of them had only a 4 per cent chance of reaching age 90, the researchers reported recently in Archives of Internal Medicine.

"This isn't surprising so much as it's reassuring," said Dr Laurel Yates of Brigham and Women's Hospital and Harvard Medical School in the US, who led the study.

"All of these factors are considered common sense."

The lifestyle message commonly had been aimed at middle-aged people in the past, so it was helpful to see that such lifestyle factors could also help the elderly add healthy years.

"If you're going to ask what's the one thing that I could do, I would say do two things: don't smoke and do exercise," Dr Yates said.

The researchers also found that the men who lived to at least 90 enjoyed better physical function and mental well-being late in their lives than men who died at a younger age. Dr Yates said research had shown that genetics counted for only about 25 to 30 per cent in determining how long people lived.


"Most people would say they don't want to have extra years added to their life if those years are going to be ones of disability and disease," Dr Yates said. "And I think it is reassuring that there is something a person can do to help increase the probability of having extra years that are good ones."

"I was reading about this self help book, 'The Secret,' written by an Australian reality producer. One fan of the book said it stopped her panic attacks and doubled her acupuncture business. I'm thinking, 'Who's going to go see a panicky acupuncturist?'" -

A Page from the Past

The Norfolk Islander - 25th February 1966

"Norfolk Whaler in a new role - The 217-ton training vessel "Arcturus", which will be used to produce the future officers and seamen of Papua-New Guinea's Merchant Service, arrived in Port Moresby in the second half of December.

The "Arcturus", was formerly the whaling and survey vessel "Norfolk Whaler" and was bought and converted by the P-N.G. Administration for £90,000. The re-fit was done in Ballina, New South Wales.

On board were 15 Papua and New Guinean trainee seamen. Cadet officers would undergo a 3 to 4 year training course, using the vessel's facilities.

Ladies Hospital Auxiliary - At a meeting of the Norfolk Island Ladies Hospital Auxiliary held on February 14th, the donation of the \$100 from the Lions Club (the first monetary transaction in decimal currency), was handed over to Secretary, Dawn Hutchinson and all members expressed pleasure at being associated with the Lions in this project and thanked them for their generosity.

Plans were made for making new curtains for four private wards and the bottling of fruit for the hospital.

"Magic" is in love - with Amy's Rhode Island Red rooster - and if Ab so much as lifts his hand to the rooster, "Magic" goes to town on Ab.

Ten days ago, Amy loaned the rooster to Ron Elliott, her nephew, who lives at Shortridge, off Queen Elizabeth Avenue.

Each morning thereafter, Amy and Ab saw "Magic" take off (it can fly) about 9.00 a.m. and come back each evening. Several people have had a visit - mostly those who own Rhode Island Red roosters - including Gwen Stanton and Cecelia Garner out at Hundred Acres, Herbie Nobbs a Bumboras, around the Anson Bay district and Moray Anderson in Taylor's Road.

Last Tuesday, Ron went to Amy and said "if you are looking for "Magic" you will find him home at my place strutting around with the rooster." Sure enough, Amy went back with Ron and there was "Magic", happy as larry with his (her) mate. They are now back with Amy and Ab contented and happy.

"Love will find a way" - and what a feat for a Magpie!

It's been a long trip - Do you remember Cina and Tali, the Siamese cats?

Mrs. Madeline Hamilton has written to us from Victoria - "Sorry I haven't written earlier, in fact I was waiting until we finally came home with Cina and Tali after spending their final 60 day sojourn in the Melbourne quarantine station.

Only their eyes reveal the frights, noises and insecurities they have both experienced since leaving Norfolk on 30th March, 1965. It's been a long trip for them, if one just stops to ponder it all for a few minutes.

So maybe our many friends on Norfolk Island who perhaps were a little doubtful of the journey Cina and Tali were taking can rest assured that the many agent's hands they passed through on their 30,000 mile journey by land, sea and air, every care was taken, and I can definitely recommend L.E.P. Transport. These people handled the interests for me in Sydney, London and in Melbourne and they have been most kind and helpful. The quarantine officers here and in London were most thoughtful in dropping me a few lines as to the welfare of Cina and Tali.

You will recall that while in quarantine in England, the cats were seen by cat fancier and author, Sir John Smythe (who has 5 Siamese cats) who will mention them in his new book "Ming" - written about Sir Winston Churchill's old ginger tomcat ot that name.

The cost of the round trip for the cats - Norfolk/London/Melbourne.

From the Norfolk Island Times, February 27th, 1935 - Stone Axe found on Slaughter Beach - Last week on Slaughter Beach, Tom McPhail found a stone axe about 6-1/2 inches long by 2-3/4 inches wide on cutting edge by 1 inch thick, evidently made on Norfolk Island.

It is evident that our coasts have suffered attrition for countless ages and Norfolk Island was once very many times the size it is now. Lord Howe is estimated to have been, at one time, 40-miles wide.

Undoubtedly plantains were found here planted in straight rows when the convict settlement arrived and the 'high' banana may even be the original found here.

Several stone axes have been dug up on the Island which have borne the stamp of having been made here. One found by Mr. Peter Buffett above the top dam in Watermill Valley was alongside some convict tools. Another was found by Johhny Robinson in Mrs. Broder's property where there was an obvious old-time garden.

Two totally dissimilar ones supposed to be ancient Moriori were dug up by Mr. Hiskins and sent to Canberra. A New Zealand expert pronounced one of these axes, about a foot long, to be an ancient Moriori tool. The Moriori are the pre-Maori race, but whence they came, none can tell.

It is thought by these indications that they may have inhabited the great lost continent which is thought to have disappeared owing to the fault in the earth's crust, extending from New Zealand to Japan. It may be that Norfolk Island was a part of this continent now sunk beneath the ocean. (Contributed by Mr. Roy Bell).

Avoid email before bed, insomniacs warned

Insomniacs have been warned that checking email up to an hour before bed has the same effect on sleep as drinking two espressos.

Research led by Dr Chris Idzikowski of the Edinburgh Sleep Centre found that light from a laptop or Blackberry is concentrated enough to signal your brain to stop production of melatonin, a natural hormone known to aid sleep disturbances.

Babies 'develop taste for alcohol in the womb'

Babies are at greater risk of becoming alcoholics in later life if their mothers drink while pregnant, research warns. Children are more likely to become alcoholics if they have been exposed to alcohol in the womb and drink again in their early teens, according to Steven Youngentob, from the State University of New York Developmental Ethanol Research Centre.

Mr Youngentob said: "There is a period during adolescence when if they get a second exposure to alcohol it reinforces the effect." The study found the propensity for alcohol addiction

subsided as the adolescents matured into adults, if they did not drink when they were growing up. Mr Youngentob added: "There is no time during pregnancy when it is safe to drink."

In the study, pregnant rats were given moderate amounts of ethanol, or grain alcohol. The baby rats that were exposed to ethanol in the womb consumed 50 per cent more alcohol than those not exposed before they were born.

Susan Fleischer, the director of the National Organisation for Foetal Alcohol Syndrome, said the study proved that children who are exposed to alcohol in the womb are more likely to drink.

The Office of the Administrator has recently received requests for urgent assistance from anxious residents who are about to travel off Norfolk Island, but who had just discovered that their passports had expired or were about expire. Not having a valid passport can prevent you from travelling.

It can take between 10 and 15 working days for a new Australian passport to be issued.

Captains, the SRC completes the network of school leadership at NICS.





Cook Islands apply for \$10-M loan for 2009 Mini Games

By Roselyn B. Monroyo, *Marianas Variety* THE Cook Islands Minister of Finance, Sir Terepai Maoate, signed last week a \$10-million application loan from Export and Import Bank of China to fund the 2009 South Pacific Mini Games.

In a report from Radio New Zealand International, Maoate said the loan will be used for the creation of a multi-purpose indoor sports stadium, and repair and upgrade of existing sports facilities and amenities.

This will be the second time that the Cook Islands will be hosting the Mini Games. They first hosted the meet in 1986.

Honiara in the Solomon Islands, was the first host in 1981. Other hosts were Nukualofa, Tonga (1989), Port Vila, Vanuatu (1993), Pago Pago, American Samoa (1997), Kingston, Norfolk Island (2001), Koror, Palau (2005). Wallis and Futuna will host the 2013 edition of the Mini Games.

Next year's Mini Games will feature only 15 sports, namely athletics, body building, boxing, golf, lawn bowls, netball, rugby league, rugby union 7, table tennis, touch rugby, triathlon, sailing, squash, canoe racing and weightlifting.


