

Gave some photos to Anne Yesterday (called in and met herself and Fiona and a couple of Fiona's Kids). Dave had sent me the photos. A few memories below, too many to mention!

As 18 year olds we shared a flat in Dublin, no clue how to look after ourselves. Remember John making 'readybrek' (bit like porridge) early days, when we went to eat it realised he had bought self raising flour!

We spent most of our days skiving off to the races etc, attendance record at lectures was horrendous, John was smart enough to still pass the exams (I wasn't!).

We gave up the flat at college year end but were staying on in Dublin for one last night out and had nowhere to stay.

At 4am we initially tried to sleep under a bush in a local park but were freezing cold so John moved us to a nearby telephone box thinking we would sleep standing up.

Not very successful, John then spotted a guy he thought was in the same university as us walking by and jumped out of the telephone box asking if we he lived nearby and could we sleep on his floor! Not a problem, same guy became a good friend.

As we weren't very successful looking after ourselves we decided to move into digs the following year, this way we were provided with meals on a daily basis so at least we were fed. Food was awful and there was a very annoying dog in the old couples house. John would routinely feed the dog custard cream biscuits that he filled with mustard, poor dog would be sneezing for hours!!

We both moved to London and carried on in similar fashion for a few years, the best of times!! Not a care in the world, spending money we didn't have and having the craic. John Colum and myself undertook a

famous trip to the Prix de Larc de Triomphe horse race in September 1989.

We met up in London after work on the Friday evening and bussed it to Paris getting back into London at 8am Monday morning. Over the course of the weekend John had somehow managed to lose one trainer and one shoe. I can still see him heading off on the tube in his suit with a trainer on one foot and a shoe on the other!

We will all miss him terribly Diane, a truly unique individual with a unique perspective on life and a great friend.
