We are here to say goodbye to our very dear sister and your very good friend.

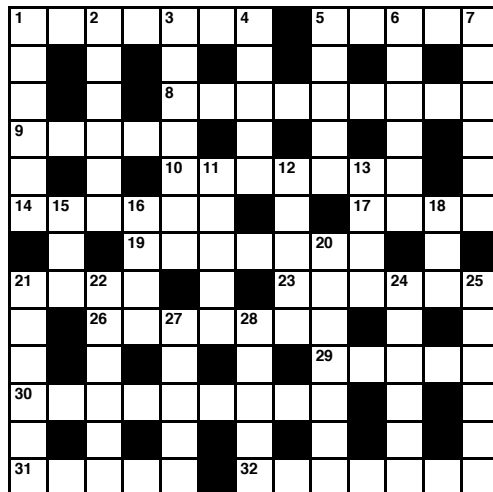
I am Andrei Lozzi, Nadia's elder brother. We also have with us our twin brothers Willim and Robert Davis and Cousin Barry Field.

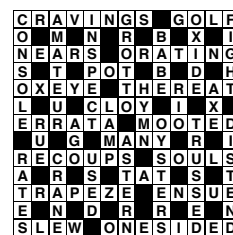

growing family. We will then welcome Robert and Christine's daughter Inga, to extend our view wider afield, which include our brothers' families' interaction with their marvellous aunt Nadia.

Nadia was nearly 2 years older than I. We often joked about how our life was like 4 or 5 individual and separate lives. Each in a different part of the world, with different scenes, different societies, politics, and each while fascinating, had their own serious challenges.

We were born a year or so before WW2. Our mother came from the north of Italy, where about a million Italians died fighting the Austrians- Hungarian Empire, to recover the North of Italy. She was horrified by the damage done to individuals and whole families. She used to say that all the young men were gone, with their uncles and only the old were left.

When Mr Mussolini aligned himself with Mr Hitler, our mother Sonia knew that it would just lead to another huge loss. Hence our family moved to Albania where our father, having been a professor of surgery at the University of Rome, was appointed director of Tirana's hospital. Unfortunately, a few years later that country was overrun by a communist regime, all that entails with its own brutal dictator. After the war was over, our mother with us children were allowed to return to Italy, but not our father. Later we learned that he had been executed for trying to help others escaping the horrors of communism.

Our mother was brave and determined, attributes that have carried on to Nadia. She learned from her how to help people in dire circumstances. To cogently put their case to authorities that did not really want to know of them. Nadia was always the bright one in the family. When our mother died, although only a little older, Nadia became my mother and father. From the age of 14 she guided my education, job applications, places to live, loaned money and showed ways to maturity. A little later she did the same for our two brothers. She sort-of became our boss.

For many years Nadia and I attended night school to acquire matriculation and obtain our first degrees. There were very many teenage migrants at that time, that were desperate to complete their education. French, English, German and of course also Australians.

While working for The Corrective Services as a Probation Officer, Nadia won a Churchill scholarship, allowing her to visit similar authorities around the world, and to provide a report that compared their methods and effectiveness. It may be of no surprise to you, that the systems that treated prisoners more humanly achieved distinctly better results. We are well informed that she became a trail blazer in her field, but I dare say politicians live on hard public opinion, not humane insights.

From there Nadia went on to be the Chief Executive Officer of a new Public Service department of NSW, The Ethnic Affairs Commission. This body worked towards improving communication and integration of the huge range of ethnic communities, into the wider affairs of NSW. Such groups may be of different nationalities, cultures, and ages. That work was very important as they make up 30% of the people in this nation, who were born elsewhere. That Commission was sorely missed when COVID struck, and several communities were inadequately prepared to implement effective health precautions.

She was ultimately included in the roll of the 50 Greatest Australians for their Contribution to Human Rights.

Possibly her greatest recognition has been when she was presented with the Order of Australia Medal by the Governor General of Australia, Sir Ninian Stephen. Sir Ninian and Lady Stephen came to the Norfolk Island in 1985, especially to make that presentation.

While this island had limited Self-Government, Nadia served as minister with several responsibilities, that included health and education. Both of which tapped into Nadia's true calling. Of late Nadia has pressed the good case, for the return some sort of limited Self-Government.
